The CSLA/AAPC College of Fellows
A Brief History

The first Fellows were elected in 1964, followed by almost annual additions averaging three Fellows per year. By 1979, over 30 members had been honoured by election to Fellowship and it was time to formalize the structure and process. At CSLA/AAPC Congress '79 in Charlottetown, the College of Fellows' was established. Specific 'Rules for the Conduct of Operations' were adopted, outlining the structure and operation of the College and the guidelines for advancement of members to Fellowship.

The College's Executive Committee is responsible for the conduct of affairs, consisting of the Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary-Treasurer, one representative of each the Accreditation Council and the Landscape Architecture Canada Foundation (LACF), as well as the CSLA/AAPC President as ex-officio member. The Annual Meeting of the College is held each year in conjunction with the CSLA/AAPC Congress. An average of 20 Fellows have attended each AGM over the last several years.

Particular attention has been given to the manner in which new Fellows are admitted to the College and the role of the College in the larger activities of the profession and the Society. In accordance with the Rules for the Conduct of Operations, nominations to Fellowship may be presented to the College by the component organizations and/or the Board of Governors of CSLA/AAPC. The final selection is made by a 'Jury of Fellows', consisting of representatives from Canada's five regions (B.C., Prairie, Ontario, Quebec and Atlantic), who are serving on the Jury for overlapping three-year terms. The Fellows-Elect are then ceremoniously inducted into the College during the banquet or other special event of the next CSLA/AAPC Congress.

Other activities of the College and its members involves assisting in the operation of the Accreditation Council, which administers the accreditation of Canadian schools/departments of landscape architecture since 1987, as well as the LACF. Since the Campaign of Fellows' commenced in 1988, over \$290,000 have been donated by Fellows to the Foundation. These funds are used to promote the ideals of the profession of landscape architecture through research and scholarship grants.

In recent years a special effort has been made to establish a profile record on each Fellow, in order to have such information available for present and future generations of landscape architects. To date, these records are on file for 70% of Fellows.

Since the inception of CSLA/AAPC, a total of 117 Fellows have been elected, 15 of whom are now deceased.

Criteria for Election to CSLA/AAPC Fellowship

Election to Fellow is the highest honour the CSLA/AAPC bestows on its members. Fellowship is the recognition of members who have made outstanding contributions to the profession over an extended period of time in one or more of the following categories:

- Executed Works of Landscape Architecture
- Administrative Professional Work in Public Agencies
- Professional University Instruction
- Professional Writing
- Service to the Community or the Public on behalf of the Society
- Direct Service to the Society

Other requirements for election are a minimum of twelve (12) years uninterrupted membership in the Society, strictly enforced confidentiality of nomination and a confirmative 75% majority vote by the Jury of Fellows. Outstanding contributions are generally considered as contributions which are above and beyond those provided by a member of the profession. Particular attention is paid to those practitioners who have made nationally or internationally recognized contributions.

Louis Beaupré

Categories: Service to the Community or the Public
Direct Service to the Society

Mr. Louis Beaupré received a bachelor's degree in Landscape Architecture from the Université de Montréal in 1981 and was accepted as a member of the AAPQ and CSLA in 1983. He began his career with several well-established landscape and planning firms before striking out on his own in 1989. Since then, his Laval, Quebec based firm, Beaupré & Associates, Experts conseils inc. has become a leader in the fields of landscape planning and design and has received numerous awards.

However, it is the field of community service and service to the profession where Louis Beaupré's contributions have been particularly important. This experience began in 1990 with the training of judges for the 'Villes, Villages et Campagnes Fleuris du Québec' competition. This provincial campaign recognizes the beautification efforts of villages, towns and cities of all sizes throughout Québec. From 1992 through 1997, Louis organized the AAPQ'S Awards of Excellence program as part of this competition and also served as judge and co-ordinator of the jury.

From 1995 to 1998, Louis served as the CSLA's, AAPQ's representative and as judge on the national organizing committee of the "Communities in Bloom" competition. This event greatly enhanced the promotion and development of the profession within the nation's municipalities.

He is currently serving as co-chair of the Canadian committee coordinating this historic ASLA/CSLA joint meeting. Louis Beaupré's contributions to the profession have been repeatedly acknowledged in Quebec. It is most fitting to now recognize his contributions also on the national level by his election to the CSLA College of Fellows.

Louis Beaupré a obtenu un baccalauréat en architecture de paysage de l'Université de Montréal en 1981 et est membre de l'AAPQ et de l'AAPC depuis 1983. Après avoir commencé sa carrière au sein de diverses firmes en architecture de paysage il choisit la ville de Laval pour y fonder sa propre entreprise, Beaupré & Associés, Experts conseils Inc. en 1989. Au fil des ans, le leadership de l'entreprise dans son domaine a été reconnu par de nombreux prix.

La contribution de Louis Beaupré a été particulièrement importante dans le domaine des services à la communauté et la profession. Mr. Patrick Bollenberghe graduated from the University of Toronto Bachelor of Landscape Architecture program with Honours in 1973. He was accepted as a member of the Ontario Association of Landscape Architects and the Canadian Society of Landscape Architects in 1977.

Patrick has been principal of the MBTW Group since 1974. He is a landscape architect, urban designer, and resort and community planner. As a design partner of the firm, he has participated in a broad spectrum of work at various scales in both the public and private sectors - from master/site planning, planned communities and institutional developments to streetscapes, theme gardens, urban parks, open space systems and courtyards. Mr. Arnis Budrevics graduated from the University of Toronto BLA Program in 1979. During his twenty year membership with the Canadian Society of Landscape Architects he has been active in both the AALA and the OALA.

Arnis initiated the creation of the CSLA National Awards Program. This program has promoted our profession by showcasing the work of Canadian landscape architects and bringing talented, young professionals to national attention. He has recently resumed his association with this program to review the rewards criteria and to enhance public recognition.

Arnis is a champion of fiscal responsibility. He has raised awareness about critical budget issues and the importance of proxy voting at both the national and the provincial levels of our profession. He was a key figure in the formation of the OALA Budget Committee, which has been critical to improving the financial management of OALA. He was elected to the OALA Council for two consecutive terms, served as Treasurer and continues to serve on the budget committee.

Arnis is also a member of the OALA task force reviewing the entry-level requirements for new members. His business sense and desire to encourage qualified people to enter the profession have greatly benefited this committee.

Mr. Vincent Dumais was awarded a Bachelor's Degree from the School of Landscape Architecture of the University of Montreal in 1986. He became a member of Quebec's Association of Landscape Architects (AAPQ) and the Canadian Society of Landscape Architects in 1989. Since 1985 he has served on the Board of AAPQ as students' representative and in 1988 as representative of associate members. In 1989 and 1990 he was elected a member of the Board and became Vice-President in 1991. From 1992 to 1997 he served as WQ President, the longest term ever held by an individual.

Vincent has always been very actively involved in the organization of congresses, both provincially and nationally, including:

in 1987 as Chair of Labash in Montreal;

in 1989 as Chair of the CSLA Congress in Quebec City;

in 1997 as Co-Chair of the CSLA Congress in Montreal; and

in 2001 as Co-Chair of the joint ASLA/CSLA meeting currently held in Montreal.

Il est reçu membre de l'Association des Architectes Paysagistes du Québec et de l'AAPC en 1989. Dès 1985, il siège au conseil d'administration de l'AAPQ en tant que représentant des étudiants puis, en 1988, comme représentant des stagiaires. Il est membre du conseil d'administration de l'AAPQ de 1989 à 1990, est élu vice-président en 1991, puis siège comme président de 1992 à 1997. C'est le plus long terme jamais effectué à ce poste.

Ms. Ann Milovsoroff is the landscape architect on staff at the Royal Botanical Gardens in Ontario. She has a BA with honours in Comparative Literature, Phi Beta Kappa, and an MLA from the University of Guelph.

Ann served on the OALA Council from 1989 to 1996 as councilor, Secretary, Vice President, President and Past President. On the CSLA Board of Governors she worked on the reciprocity agreement between CSLA and ASLA. Ann has received the OALA Writer's Award, and the David Erb Award for Exemplary Service.

As a member of ASLA she was Secretary of the Ontario Chapter from 1987-89, served on the Editorial Advisory Committee of Landscape Architecture Magazine, on the Membership Services Committee, as Chair of the Annual Meeting Administration Committee, as Vice President for Membership, and Vice President for Public Information and Services. Mr. David Mitchell graduated from the British Columbia Institute of Technology in 1972. After gaining experience with Dan Matsushita & Associates, he completed the BCSLA registration examination and obtained membership in the BCSLA and CSLA in 1977.

He began professional practice as principal of J.D. Mitchell & Associates Ltd. and in 1982 formed a partnership now known as DMG Landscape Architects. DMG has won numerous awards over the years, including five CSLA Design Awards.

David has been a Director, Registrar/Executive Director and President of the BCSLA. As its Past President he served two years on the CSLA Board of Governors. In 1998 he was acclaimed President Elect and served as CSLA President in 1999. He was instrumental in finalizing agreements between CSLA and ASLA to facilitate this Montreal joint meeting. David has had a long term role as BCSLA Chair of the Landscape Standards Joint Committee with the BC Landscape & Nursery Trades Association to publish the BC Landscape Standard. The first edition was published in 1983 and the sixth in 2001. This document won a CSLA Award.

Richard Moore

Mr. Richard Moore, a native of Montreal, graduated from Michigan State University in Landscape Architecture in 1969. He undertook graduate studies at Guelph University from 1998 to 2000.

Rick was accepted as a member of the AAPQ in 1971, as well as the OALA and CSLA in 1976. He was elected to the OALA Council in 1985 and served as President in 1986-87. He represented the OALA on the CSLA Board of Governors in 1987-88.

Rick has worked in the United States, in the Sultanate of Oman and in Canada. After several years with consulting engineering firms in Montreal and Toronto, he established his own firm in 1981. Moore-George Associates provided consulting services to the public sector from 1981 to 1997. Water fronts, parks, open space planning and urban design were the focus of this practice. Water fronts have always been an area of particular interest to Rick. His contributions have transformed many neglected sites to useful features in both small towns such as Kenora and in larger centres such as Toronto, North Bay and Mississauga, winning him several professional awards.

In 1997 he started Vogel Moore Ltd, a landscape architectural design-build firm that serves the tourism area of South Georgian Bay in Ontario.

Rick has taught courses in landscape architecture at both the University of Toronto and Guelph. He has promoted the principles of landscape architecture to countless municipal committees and councils in his over 30 years of consulting practice. Christopher Phillips

Mr. Christopher Phillips obtained a Bachelor's Degree in Landscape Architecture in 1979 from the University of Guelph. He was accepted as a member of BCSLA and CSLA in 1982. He has been a member of a number of Vancouver City Advisory Committees, often as a representative of the BCSLA, including the Urban Design Panel, the Vancouver City Planning Commission, and chairing the Public Art Committee. He was involved in a series of conferences and design charettes to encourage City Council to address sustainable development opportunities in the planning of the Southeast False Creek lands, as well as other design charettes, thesis committees, and awards juries.

Chris is the founding partner of the Vancouver based firm, Phillips Farevaag Smallemberg, offering landscape architecture, community planning, and urban design services. The firm has been recognized for its design excellence with over thirty awards, including eleven CSLA awards for projects under Chris' direction. His design work has had far-reaching impact on the landscapes and open spaces of the City of Vancouver and its neighbouring municipalities and smaller communities across British Columbia. Janet is founder and principal of Janet Rosenberg and Associates Landscape Architects Inc. Her distinguished and illustrious designs include Courthouse Square in the heart of downtown Toronto, the Niagara Butterfly Conservatory Gardens, the ten-acre central campus Common at York University, Barrel Warehouse Park and Streetscapes in the City of Waterloo, and the Loblaws sponsored Feature/Dream Gardens at the annual Canada Blooms Flower and Garden Show.

Following his graduation from the University of Guelph in 1970 with a B.L.A., Mr. Thomas Sparling became an associate with Michael Hough & Jim Stansbury working on projects such as Campus planning for the University of Alberta and guidelines for Forest Management in Ontario. Following that, he established the Toronto office of New York based BHI Limited, Environmental Planners. As Chief landscape Architect he was charged with determining locations for high voltage transmission line corridors in the Greater Toronto region.

Since joining the Department of Architectural Science and Landscape Architecture at the Ryerson Polytechnic University in 1975, he has been both Professor and Program Director, where he has enjoyed learning from his many students who have become stalwarts of the profession throughout Canada.

In addition to teaching, Tom's recent focus has been the design and restoration of private and institutional landscapes from city gardens to rural estates. Projects designed by Tom have been featured in books including in a Canadian Garden by Nicoloy Eaton and Hilary Weston, and Foliage and Design by Marjorie Harris, as well as publications including Toronto Life, Canadian Gardening and Canadian House and Home Magazine.
