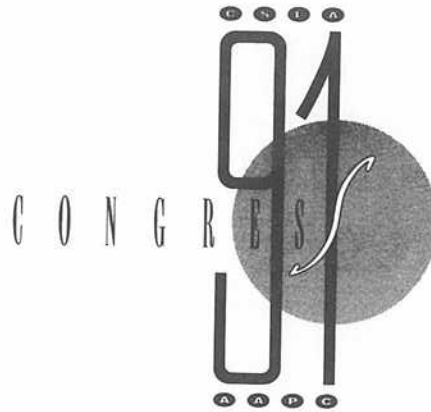

Professional Background

Joe Berridge is a principal of the firm Berridge Lewinberg Greenberg Ltd.

Berridge Lewinberg Greenberg provides a wide range of urban planning, design and development consulting services to public and private clients. It specializes in downtown and waterfront planning and the design of new communities with a focus on large, mixed-use, complex projects. For the public sector the firm undertakes policy and administration analysis, particularly in the area of housing, land management and the implementation of planning objectives through zoning and Official Plans.

The firm's staff includes planners, designers, architects and economists. It currently has projects in London, New York, Moscow and the Caribbean as well as in Toronto and Montreal.

Joe Berridge is primarily involved in the planning and development management of major mixed-use projects. He is currently responsible for the planning of the Exhibition Place Trade Centre in Toronto and for major private developments in North York, London and New York.

Memberships and Professional Involvements

Joe Berridge has lectured regularly on urban design and development issues at Columbia University in New York and at many other universities in Canada and was part of American Institute of Architects' work team reviewing the San Francisco downtown plan. He served on the Advisory Committee of the National Capital Commission in Ottawa, the Mayor's Committee on Transportation in Toronto and the National Bid Steering Committee for Expo 2000. He was a juror on the 1987 "Progressive Architecture" awards and on the Mississauga Urban Design Awards jury. In 1989 he was keynote speaker at the Toronto City Plan '91 Conference. He frequently contributes radio talks, T.V. appearances and newspaper articles on urban issues.

Carol L. Franklin

"When you have a clear vision of a place, that reality is manifest as valuable and beautiful. I'm interested in designing projects which do not violate the reality of the land, and in seeing these projects through to completion, because it is only at this final stage that you know this ideal has been achieved." - Carol Franklin

The integration of distinctive project designs with successful technical solutions is Carol's signature on the many ecological planning, site design, and reclamation projects she has directed. Carol developed innovative construction and site restoration techniques on an Algonquin Gas Transmission Company pipeline, which was installed through the Loantaka Brook Reservation directing the environmental analysis, revised alignment, site protection, and park restoration, which resulted in greatly reduced construction and disturbance areas and a parklike right-of-way landscape management plan.

Carol has a comprehensive background in landscape design and management. She has worked closely with a number of arboreta and nature centers to develop their program potential, thematic structure, and design realization, including the Crosby Arboretum in Picayune MS, the Institute of Ecosystems Studies of the New York Botanical Garden in Millbrook NY, Manitoga, Man With Nature Center, in Garrison NY, and the Reeves Reed Arboretum in Summit NJ.

Carol is a registered landscape architect and Adjunct Professor at the University of Pennsylvania's Graduate School of Landscape Architecture and Regional Planning. She works with community and volunteer groups on local restoration projects. She lectures and gives seminars around the country, including professional education programs of the American Society of Landscape Architects.

Experience

For the past five years Mr. Franson has worked with the Souris Basin Development Authority, Estevan, Saskatchewan as a Parks, Recreation, and Lands Use Consultant responsible for delivery of planning services to the Crown Corporation created to look after the building of Rafferty/Alameda Dams and various developments thereon, including the new Mainprize Park and a Wetlands Complex.

Prior to that Mr. Franson was a private consultant with Franson Ventures Ltd. and while at Associated Engineering Services Ltd., Regina he was Senior Planner, Community Planning Services Department responsible for delivery of planning services to municipal, government, and private clients. Services included municipal, land use, and recreation planning, environmental, and social impact assessment.

Marne Helgesen

Marne George Helgesen received her undergraduate degree from the University of Minnesota in 1962 in Chemistry and Biology. She became certified as an ASCP medical technologist and headed the Microbiology Department of a large medical clinic for ten years in Champaign, Illinois. Having spent two years in Brainerd, Minnesota free lancing as a community college instructor and at the Brainerd State School and Hospital supervising their laboratory, Dr. Helgesen returned to Champaign with her family. There she began teaching biochemistry, anatomy and physiology at Parkland Community College. It was at this time that she began to develop an interest in learning theory, curriculum development and (God forbid) teaching. She entered graduate school and subsequently received her Ed. M. in Curriculum Development and her Ph.D. in Human Resource Development. Both of these degrees are from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Following her graduation, Dr. Helgesen has since received UIUC appointments as Head of the Division of Instructional Development, Coordinator for Instructional Support in the College of Commerce and Business Administration, and Assistant Professor for Curriculum and Instruction in the Department of Landscape Architecture. Her areas of specialization include application of learning theory to the classroom environment, learning style preferences research within and across disciplines, and the development of systems approaches for instructors wishing to implement ongoing feedback from and dialogue with their students.

Dr. Helgesen is the wife of a clinical psychologist, mother of four children, and an avid tennis player and sports enthusiast as well as a very busy consultant for business and academe.

Randolph T. Hester, Jr.

Randolph T. Heater, Jr. is Professor and Chair of the Department of Landscape Architecture at the University of California, Berkeley, and a principal in the firm, Community Development by Design. Mr. Hester has written numerous books and articles on landscape and city design, grassroots planning and community development. His books include Community Goal Setting with Frank Smith, Planning Neighborhood Space with People, the participatory design classic Neighborhood Space, The Meanings of the Garden with Mark Francis and Community Design Primer.

In addition to his academic pursuits, Mr. Hester is a practicing landscape architect. His completed projects demonstrate his ideals and have won national and international awards: The Virginia Dare Award, the National Trust for Historic Preservation Trust Award, American Society of Landscape Architects Honor and Merit Awards, All-American City Award and the International Society of Technical Communication Award, Washington Association of Cities Award and the Washington Community Development Award.

Mr. Hester worked for three years with Cambridge, Massachusetts neighborhood groups in a successful effort to save their communities from the Inner Belt freeway. In Raleigh, North Carolina he established a city-wide citizen participation program which developed neighborhood plans, based on local goals; he conceived and implemented a multimillion dollar open space plan that rectified past class and racial discrimination in providing public parks; he organized a grassroots effort to stop freeway construction that led to an alternative, low-cost transportation plan for the city; and he worked for ten years to realize a neighborhood rehabilitation plan for Chavis Heights, a Black community that had been scheduled for urban renewal clearance.

Mr. Hester's firm has just completed a plan for Castle Rock, Washington, on a river corridor plan to reconstruct the riparian zone along the Cowlitz River that was destroyed by the eruption of Mt. St. Helens. The first phase, an award-winning exhibit hall created totally by grassroots volunteers, opened in May of 1990.

In the past year, he worked on plans for the earthquake recovery in Santa Cruz, California, now adopted as the first principles for rebuilding downtown. Presently, his firm is working with the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy to create a plan for the lands around the unpaved portions of Mulholland Drive.

Mr. Hester has degrees in landscape architecture and sociology from North Carolina State and Harvard Universities.

Glenn Pushelberg

Glenn Pushelberg and George Yabu graduated from Toronto's Ryerson Polytechnical Institute and established Yabu Pushelberg in 1980. Yabu Pushelberg is a leader in the development of unique interior design.

Glenn is directly involved in all aspects of marketing and presides over close client contact to produce projects that have gained Yabu Pushelberg a strong profile in the global market. This is further supported by the recent lectures, panel discussions and interviews Glenn has participated in.

George and Glenn are both the recipients of many design awards including the prestigious Designer of the Year Award 1987 (George Yabu) and 1990 (Glenn Pushelberg) from ARIDO (Association of Interior Designers of Ontario), East Meets West, International 1988, I.B.D. (Institute of Business Designers) U.S.A. 1986, Interiors Magazine Annual Award, U.S.A. (1988) and I.D. Magazine (1989). The firm has had numerous projects published in design journals worldwide, North American, France, The Netherlands, Japan and soon to be published in Hong Kong.

Over the years projects have included hotels, shopping centres, night clubs, corporate spaces, restaurants and retail stores. Yabu Pushelberg's range of experience is diverse, having recently completed a new concept for a mini department store in Vancouver, "Plaza Escada", two specialty department stores, Sunrise Department Stores in Taiwan, Republic of China, and engineering school in Tokyo, the international award winning night club "Stilife" and the critically acclaimed restaurant "Oceans". Current projects include 2 luxury hotel projects in Japan, one in Sapporo, the other in Osaka, as well as two retail complexes in Tokyo.

Yabu Pushelberg has recently ventured into furniture design with Craig Johnson (Toronto) and also have begun designing area rugs, handmade in Hong Kong for Elite Carpets.

Harriet B. Saperstein

In early February, 1990, Harriet Saperstein accepted the position as President of HP DEVCO, INC., a non-profit economic development agency. HP DEVCO was established and funded by the Chrysler Motors Corporation and the City of Highland Park, Michigan to create and expand business and industrial development within Highland Park.

She has been involved in a wide variety of economic, recreation, parks, waterfront and general planning and development activities since 1967 when she left academic life for government work. In 1975 she joined the Detroit Recreation Department as riverfront projects coordinator. In 1981 she became Head Planner, responsible for all major capital planning and a wide variety of development and programming projects.

Her major responsibility in the last 10 years has been coordinating the Linked Riverfront Parks Project, a \$30 million public recreational development which has served as a catalyst for more than \$300 million worth of private developments on the east riverfront of Detroit. The "LRPP" includes three parks, connecting bicycle/pedestrian linkages, and related programming and residential and commercial development activities. Chene Park, an award-winning arts park which opened in 1984 is now having its amphitheater and supportive festival facilities enlarged. St. Aubin Park and Marina opened in 1989, and offers transient marina facilities and interpretive exhibits celebrating the Great Lakes heritage. Mt. Elliott Park will open in 1990-91 with a theme featuring the labor, industrial and social history of this historic industrial area. Mrs. Saperstein helped bring together more than 30 different grants from a dozen different state, federal and local agencies and organizations to pay for the planning, design and construction of these regional recreational facilities.

Mrs. Saperstein is a sociologist by training and has taught urban sociology at the State University of New York in Buffalo, Brown University and Wayne State University. She has also lectured extensively on urban and recreational planning, the impact of urban renewal on business/church relocation and urban renewal and family structure and ethnic mobility.

She has received two international fellowships. In 1976-77, she was an Honorary Research Fellow at the Centre for Urban Studies, University of Birmingham, England. In 1984, she held the post of Visiting Research Fellow at the Polytechnic of North London. In both these cases, as well as during her 1983 educational leave to Stockholm, Sweden, she researched recreation and waterfront planning and development and lectured to students, professional, and community groups in Sweden and Germany.

She has been an invited speaker at conferences in Washington, Chicago, Minneapolis, and New York City, and a waterfront and recreational development consultant to communities and groups throughout the United States and Canada. Most recently she was one of 25 nationally known experts invited to participate in the September 1989 "Toronto Waterfront Charrette", an intensive workshop designed to evaluate and make recommendations for the development of the entire Toronto Waterfront.
